UCLA Early Academic Outreach Program

The Early Academic Outreach Program (EAOP) was established in 1976 by the University of California to expand postsecondary education opportunities for California's educationally disadvantaged students. EAOP is an academic preparation program that works collaboratively with families, educators, schools, communities, and various campus departments to provide students with challenging academic enrichment activities to promote and cultivate a college-going culture. UCLA EAOP works with students to help them become competitively eligible applicants for college admission, going beyond minimum eligibility. EAOP is one of the state's most successful pre-collegiate student academic development programs. UCLA's EAOP works with over 15,000 students in middle school and high school each year. This includes working with 66 high schools and 34 middle schools in 10 school districts. Since 1991, approximately 60% of EAOP seniors meet UC eligibility each year, 82% attend a postsecondary institution upon high school graduation and 62% attend a 4-year institution, with 25% attending a UC school. Academic Advising

EAOP specializes in individual and group academic advising that helps students complete the 'a–g' college-preparatory courses required for UC/CSU admission.

Academic Enrichment

EAOP students improve basic skills, master advanced high school curriculum and have the opportunity to engage in the intellectual life of the University through study and research.

Entrance Exams

SAT and ACT preparation workshops and in-depth classes familiarize students with test formats, study strategies and test-taking tips, and provide extensive practice with verbal and mathematics questions.

College Knowledge

Students and parents learn about financial aid and scholarships, how to fill out college applications and write effective personal statements. They tour campuses, attend workshops, go on field trips and learn about California's postsecondary education options.

UC 'A-G' ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

A. History/Social Science - 2 years required

Two years of history/social science to include: one year of U.S. history or one-half year of U.S. history and one-half year of civics or American government; and one year of world history, cultures, and geography.

B. English - 4 years required

Four years of college preparatory English that includes frequent and regular writing, and reading of classic and modern literature, and poetry. Not more than two semesters of grade 9 English can be used to meet this requirement.

C. Mathematics - 3 years required, 4 recommended

Three years, including elementary algebra, geometry, and second year (advanced) algebra. Mathematics courses taken in grades 7 and 8 (with a minimum grade of C) may be used to fulfill part of this requirement if the high school accepts them as equivalent to its own math courses.

D. Laboratory Science - 2 years required, 3 recommended

Two years of laboratory science providing fundamental knowledge in at least two of these three areas: biology, chemistry, and physics. Lab courses in earth/space sciences are acceptable if they have as prerequisites or provide basic knowledge in biology, chemistry, or physics. The last two years of an approved three-year integrated science program that provides rigorous coverage of at least two of the three foundational subjects may be used to fulfill this requirement. Not more than one year of grade 9 lab science can be used to meet this requirement.

E. Language Other than English - 2 years required, 3 recommended

Two years of the same language other than English. Courses should emphasize speaking and understanding, and include instruction in grammar, vocabulary, reading, and composition.

F. Visual and Performing Arts – 1 year required

A single yearlong approved arts course from a single discipline: dance, drama/theater, music, or visual art.

G. College Preparatory Electives - 1 year required

One year (two semesters), in addition to those required in "a-f" above, chosen from the following areas: visual and performing arts, history, social science, English, advanced mathematics, laboratory science, and language other than English (a third year in the language used for the "e" requirement or two years of another language).

UCLA Extension Education Department (UNEX) offers 350 courses annually with approximately 8,000 enrollments in classroom-based and distance learning formats for teachers, school administrators, and parents as educators throughout the community and California. For over 80 years the UNEX mission has been to provide staff development, in-service, and professional outreach to practitioners at all levels of education-preschool through elementary, secondary, adult, and higher education. The department offers a variety of California teaching credential and UCLA Extension certificate programs. State-approved credential programs include: 1) the Urban Intern Teacher Preparation Program, an innovative model designed to train outstanding elementary and secondary urban classroom teachers; 2) a comprehensive Designated Subjects Adult and Career Technical Education credential program as well as an in-depth credential advisement and processing service; 3) the Reading Certificate program and the Reading and Language Arts Specialist Credential Programs; as well as 4) the CLAD Certificate Through CTEL program. In Summer 2009, the department will launch an Education Specialist Mild/Moderate Intern Credential program. UCLA Extension certificate programs include: 1) Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL) and Teaching English as a Foreign Language (TEFL); and 2) the Basic and Advanced Core Early Childhood Education Certificate program is designed to train Teachers and Supervisors/Administrators of Children Ages 0-5 (Title 5/Title 22/Child Development Permits).



The Vice Provost Initiative for Pre-College Scholars, known as VIP Scholars, is a partnership between UCLA and the Los Angeles and Pasadena school districts to help prepare historically underrepresented students become competitively eligible for admission to UCLA and to encourage pursuit of graduate and professional education. VIP Scholars is focused on underserved students, including students from low-income and first-generation families. VIP Scholars services include college preparatory workshops, Buddy Days, Parent Nights, Saturday Academies, college advising, major and career seminars, and an annual residential, academically rigorous summer program.

The VIP Scholars Program is pleased to report that 94% of its first graduating cohort (class of 2008) is enrolled at four-year universities, including UCLA, UC Berkeley, UC Santa Barbara, UC San Diego, Stanford, Yale, and Spelman.

Why Partnerships?

Educational partnerships are an important tool for increasing the capacity of California's public schools to prepare all students for college. In fact, developing partnerships was identified by California State Superintendent of Public Instruction Jack O'Connell's P-16 Council as one of 14 recommendations for closing the achievement State's growing Partnerships provide a space for districts. education institutions. community groups to bring together resources to promote college readiness and success for all students.

BEST Collaboration In LA County

Throughout Los Angeles County, school districts and institutions of higher education collaborate in order to advance educational opportunity, academic success, and college going for K-12 students. Established in 2005, the BEST Collaboration in LA County initiative builds a regional partnership of such collaborations so that they can learn from each other, avoid duplication and enhance synergy, band together when useful, and support new collaborations in order to improve K-12 public schools throughout

LA County. The initiative developed as a result of an agreement between the California County Superintendents Educational Services Association (CCSESA) and the University of California (UC) to build P-16 alliances. It is currently governed by a steering committee that includes representatives from the Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE), the Los Angeles Unified School District, Local District 7, the University of California, Los Angeles, and the University of Southern California.

Initiative Goals

The ultimate goal of *BEST Collaboration in LA County* is to increase the proportion of students, particularly those from under-represented groups, who earn a baccalaureate degree. *BEST* supports partnerships between K-12 schools and districts and institutions of higher education (IHEs) in their efforts to prepare middle and high school students for college.









Accomplishments

In the last three years, *BEST Collaboration in LA County* has hosted six daylong conferences for established K-12/IHE partnerships. Topics have included fostering strong partnerships, creating a college going culture, and engaging parents in this work. The conferences have been well received by participants who report learning from them. Participating partnerships involve four districts (Antelope Valley Union High School District, Centinela Valley Union High School District, Long Beach Unified School District, and Los Angeles Unified School District, Local District 7) and five higher education institutions (Antelope Valley College, Long Beach City College, California State University, Long Beach, the University of California, Los Angeles, and the University of Southern California). *BEST* has also conducted a survey of K-12 districts to learn about existing partnerships and desired new collaborations. A similar survey of higher education institutions is underway now. Resource guides based on conference activities and materials, conference evaluations, and K-12 survey results are all available online at http://apep-bestla.gesis.ucla.edu/.

Next Steps

BEST Collaboration in LA County would like to involve more K-12/IHE partnerships in shared, sustained work, following the model already established. To do so, it is first hosting a get together for all K-12 districts and higher education institutions in Los Angeles County in order to identify potential participants in BEST's work (more below). They will join current BEST partnerships in an 18-month commitment to participate as a team in three BEST conferences and to address self-identified goals from each conference in the intervening months. On the data-gathering front, the survey of higher education institutions' current and desired collaborations with K-12 districts will be completed and results will be shared widely.

The Fall 2008 Conference

To be held at LACOE on November 19, 2008 from 8:00 am to 2:00 pm, this event is intended for both existing partnerships seeking to improve upon and expand their current work and also those school districts and higher education institutions interested in developing new collaborations. Patricia Gándara and Gary Orfield, co-directors of the Civil Rights Project/Proyecto Derechos Civiles, will be the featured speakers, a panel of K-12 superintendents and higher education leaders will discuss their collaborations, and there will be ample opportunities to seek out new collaborations and renew current collaborations. District Superintendents and/or senior district officials are invited to attend, as are IHE representatives with a working knowledge of the university/college resources available for collaborations preparing K-12 students for college.
